What Makes for Peak Rifle Accuracy?

What makes one rifle accurate and another inaccurate? That is a question that many people have asked over the years. The basic principles of rifle accuracy are the same whether you are dealing with a high-grade benchrest rifle or a bolt-action hunting rifle.

Most of my experience with rifle accuracy has been in competition benchrest shooting. I shot my first match in the summer of 1982 and have been shooting in registered competition ever since. My experience with rifle building began a little before I began shooting benchrest. But in general, I have been stocking and later barreling the benchrest rifles that I shoot in competition since I started shooting competitively. There is nothing like building tight necked 6 PPC's and Waldogs to teach you what it takes to make a rifle accurate.

There are no deep dark secrets to obtain peak rifle accuracy, only top quality mechanics. For the purpose of this discussion, the rifle will consist of three major parts, the barreled action, the stock and the scope. You cannot have top accuracy without all three parts pulling their weight.

The Barreled Action

The relationship of the barrel and action can best be thought of as how every part of the barreled action relates to the oenterline. The centerline is an imaginary line passing from the center of the bore through the center of the action. The centerline may be imaginary but can readily be determined with the aid of a good 0.0001" dial indicator. Of primary importance, the chamber has to be absolutely concentric and parallel to the centerline of the bore with the bolt face being an absolute 90-degree perpendicular to the centerline. The kicker here is that this is hard to accomplish because it is dependent on three different separate parts, the bolt, receiver and barrel and how they fit up to each other.

The bolt body, firing pin, barrel threads and chamber should be completely in line with the centerline of the bore. The action lug recess, bolt lugs, bolt face, receiver face and barrel shoulder need to be 90 degrees to the centerline. The bolt lugs and action lugs should make full contact on all locking surfaces. The action threads and barrel threads should make full contact on the bearing surface of the threads with no contact between the top of the barrel thread and the bottom of the action threads. The chamber should be a size to precisely fit the cartridge case.

The shape or angle of the grown makes practically no difference as long as there are no burrs or irregularities in the grown and that one side of the bullet doesn't clear the barrel before the opposite side of the bullet does. In other words, the barrel doesn't need to be longer on one side than on the other.

Why, you may ask does all this concentricity and 90 degree stuff make any difference? The sole purpose is to launch a bullet precisely centered in the bore straight down the center of the bore and out the crown with as little wobble as possible. If the bolt face is at 90 degrees to the chamber and the barrel bore, some of the relationships in the receiver don't have to be perfect and still you will obtain peak accuracy. The thing is that it is far easier to obtain a bolt face perfectly at 90 degrees to the chambered barrel if every other part is in its proper relationship within the receiver.

An oversize chamber can ruin all your best efforts at building a tack-driving rifle. The oversize chamber will allow the cartridge to lie in the bottom of the chamber and throw the bullet out of alignment with the bore. Why then do benchrest shooters get such good groups when they are fireforming brass? The necks of their cases are turned to such close tolerances that the bullet is still in alignment with the bore as well as the case head is still supported by the chamber.

I haven't mentioned anything about barrel quality. I have used barrels from most of the top makers of benchrest barrels and have had high quality barrels from all of the makers that I have used. If you are going to economize on building a oustom rifle, the barrel is not the place to do it. Stick with a top maker and it's hard to go wrong.

Good triggers are oritical for the accurate rifle. Not that it is necessary for peak accuracy, but that it makes peak accuracy easier to obtain. Two-ounce trigger have their place in the accurate rifle. That place is on target rifles. With practice a twoounce trigger can be squeezed and released if wind conditions change, but only if they are being shot from the bench. Two-ounce triggers and field conditions don't mix. I once had a two-ounce trigger mounted on my .280 deer rifle. I was watching a coyote come into a windmill at 300 yards. I placed my crosshairs on him and had a dead coyote. Only thing was, I wasn't ready to shoot yet or at least, so I thought. I replaced that trigger that day with a two-pound trigger and haven't used a two-ounce trigger on a hunting rifle again.

The Stook

The stock and its relationship to the barreled action play a significant role in the accuracy of the rifle. There are three major methods of stock bedding to barreled action. In the majority of benchrest rifles, the predominant method is the glue-in in which the action is glued into the stock with epoxy glue. Another method that is being used is pillar bedding. Conventional glass bedding is also used, but by very few in the benohrest oommunity.

The glue-in is the easiest to use and the easiest method to obtaining an accurate rifle. It does, however, have its drawbacks. For one, it is harder to take the action from the stook in case of mechanical problems. Triggers have to be able to be removed from the bottom of the stook, which is no problem with the actions commonly used in benohrest. These actions usually have trigger brackets that are removable from beneath the action. The Remington actions that are being used in competition have holes through the stook that allow the trigger pins to be driven out and the trigger removed. This is not too practical if the glue-in happens to be on a hunting rifle like a Remington 700. The thumb safety would make it extremely difficult to remove the trigger from the bottom. Secondly, just because an action is glued-in doesn't mean that it is glued-in without stresses on the action. If the action is stressed when it is glued-in, you then have a bedding problem. But, it's a bedding problem that you can't detect. Lastly, the glue-in is intended to be bedded permanently. But in time a glue-in can become completely or partially unglued by oleaning solvent seeping under the action or any other number of reasons. Murphy's law applies to this really well. When you can least afford the gun coming apart is probably the time it will. A friend of mine had just shot a 0.140 group at 100 yards in the previous match, when his action came unglued before he could shoot the next group. The 0.140 did win him small group for the 100yard segment, but he was unable to finish the match. That won't happen with a pillar bedded rifle and is also unlikely to happen with a properly glued-in action.

Pillar bedding with aluminum or glass pillars is a method that has started showing up in a large number of benchrest rifles, as well as in high accuracy hunting rifles. As you can guess from my opinion of glueins, the rifles that I shoot in competition are pillar bedded. (I now use both methods in competition, pillar beds and glue-ins. I did shoot strictly pillar beds in '96 when this article was published. A properly done gluein will not cause any problem.) The glue-in is still the most popular bedding method in benchrest competition. But, the number of top competitors, such as L. E. Red Cornelison, Harold Broughton, Speedy Gonzales, Frank Wilson and others, that have shot pillar bedded rifles in competition shows that they believe that they are not losing any acourgoy because their rifles are not glued-in. Believe me, if a competitor thought that he was at any disadvantage by shooting a pillar bedded rifle, there is no way that he would be shooting it in competition.

One of the chief advantages with pillar bedding is that the rifle can be taken apart. (continued on page 25)

Dan Kjelland Wins NW Season Opener

TRA:RC held its benchrest season opener on April 1 & 2, with 15 shooters showing up to vie for the Allen Bench Trophy. The award is given by the Puget Sound Sniper's Congress, a shooter's club formed in 1944 and the oldest in the NW. As you have already surmised, this year's winner is yours truly. It's my first 2 gun win, and it came as a great surprise. At the end of last season I bought some Hottenstein 68 gr BT bullets with a gift certificate from Bullet-Central.com. Using LT-32, I tried them in 4 different 6ppc Krieger barrels, all chambered with the same reamer. One produced some of the best results I have seen in practice. So I figured I could set my sights on maybe winning one of the 6 weekend events this year, never suspecting it could be the first one. Here's how it went.

Saturday started out with 45 degrees and a light rain but the shooting made it stop and our targets stayed dry. Skies were overcast and the wind was light. At 100 yards Steve immediately seized the lead with his 22 PPC and held it convincingly, all morning. In the LV-100 his winning agg was .1860, and he earned the coffee cup with his .107 small group. Second best was Jim Stipe with a strong .2032 agg.

By noon it had warmed up to 54 degrees with the same light wind. At 200 yards Steve continued to dominate, winning the LV-200 with a terrific .1728 agg. He also shot the smallest afternoon group at .191. Mustafa finished second best with a .2513 agg. Steve finished the day with a winning . 1794 LV Grand agg and held all the cards going into Sunday. Second place went to Jim Stipe with a .2396 grand agg.

Sunday morning was a bit cooler, at 38 deg. The sky was clear and sunny with winds about the same as Saturday. The number of shooters increased to 17 with the addition of Khanh Nguyen and new shooter John Chang. In the HV-200 the conditions were probably the toughest of the weekend. A number of shooters were stung by groups that went over an inch. Matt read his flags best and won the HV-200 with a .2611 agg. He also shot the smallest group at .290. Second place was taken by John with a .2868 agg.

In the afternoon the temperature reached 58 degrees and there was enough sun to add mirage. to the sight picture. In the HV-100 John continued to press the action, and ended up shooting the winning agg of .2154. Eldon was close on his heels, taking second with his .2176. Dan shot the smallest group, a screamer measuring .090. John. finished his very first day of shooting at TR&RC by winning the HV Grand with a .2511. Dan placed second with a .2668 grand agg.

With a strong finish in the HV-100 Dan advanced for the win, shooting a LV/HV Grand agg of .2622. Steve was unable to keep up the intense pressure of the first day and dropped to second with a .2752. Mark's efforts earned a third place finish, shooting a .2851 grand agg. And with that, the first match of the season was in the books.

Spring is warming up and everyone is looking forward to more action at the TR&RC Manley Oakley Championship on May 6 & 7.



Six Tips for Better Results at Club Matches

Every summer weekend, there are probably 400 or more club "fun matches" conducted around the country. One of the good things about these club shoots is that you don't have to spend a fortune on equipment to have fun. But we've seen that many club shooters handicap themselves with a few common equipment. oversights or lack of attention to detail while reloading. Here are SIX TIPS that can help you avoid these common mistakes, and build more accurate ammo for your olub matches.



1. Benchrest rear bag - Align Front Rest and Rear Bags. We see many shooters whose rear bag is angled left or right. relative to the bore axis. This can happen when you rush your set-up. But even if you set the gun up carefully, the rear bag can twist due to recoil or the way your arm contacts the bag. After every shot, make sure your rear bag is aligned properly (this is especially important for bag squeezers who may actually pull the bag out of alignment as they squeeze).

Forum member ArtB adds: "To align my front rest and rear bag with the target, I use an old golf club shaft. I run it from my front rest stop through a line that crosses over my speed screw and into the slot between the two ears. I stand behind that set-up and make sure I see a straight line pointing at the target. I also have a piece of tape that I've placed on the golf shaft that indicates how far the back end of the rear bag should be placed from the front rest stop. Don't have an old golf shaft? Go to Home Depot and buy an inexpensive piece of wood dowel."

2. Avoid Contact Interference - We see three common kinds of contact or mechanical interference that can really hurt accuracy. First, if your stock has front and/or rear sling swivels make sure these do NOT contact the front or rear bags at any point of the gun's travel. When a sling swivel digs into the front bag that can

cause a shot to pop high or low. To avoid this, reposition the rifle so the swivels don't contact the bags or simply remove the swivels before your match. Second, watch out for the rear of the stock grip area. Make sure this is not resting on the bag as you fire and that it can't come back to contact the bag during recoil. That lip or edge at the bottom of the grip can cause problems when it contacts the rear bag. Third, watch out for the stud or arm on the front rest that limits forward stook travel. With some rests this is high enough that it can actually contact the barrel. We encountered one shooter recently who was complaining about "vertical flyers" during his match. It turns out his barrel was actually hitting the front stop! With most front rests you can either lower the stop or twist the arm to the left or right so it won't contact the barrel.



3. Weigh Your Charges - Every One. This may sound obvious, but many folks still rely on a powder measure. Yes we know that most short-range BR shooters throw their charges without weighing, but if you're going to pre-load for a club match there is no reason NOT to weigh your charges. You may be surprised at how inconsistent your powder measure actually is. One of our testers was recently throwing H4198 charges from a Harrell's measure for his 30BR. Each charge was then weighed twice with a Denver Instrument lab scale. Our tester found that thrown charges varied by up to 0.7 grains! And that's with a premium measure.



4. Measure Your Loaded Ammo - After Bullet Seating. Even if you've oheoked your brass and bullets prior to assembling your ammo, we recommend that you weigh your loaded rounds and measure them from base of case to bullet ogive using a comparator. If you find a round that is "way off" in weight or more than .005" off your intended base to ogive length, set it aside and use that round for a fouler. (Note: if the weight is off by more than 6 or 7 grains you may want to disassemble the round and check your powder charge.) With premium, pre-sorted bullets, we've found that we can keep 95% of loaded rounds within a range of .002", measuring from base (of case) to ogive. Now, with some lots of bullets, you just can't keep things within .002", but you should still measure each loaded match round to ensure you don't have some cases that are way too short or way too long.

5. Scope Ring - Check Your Fasteners. Before a match you need to double-check your scope rings or iron sight mounts to ensure everything is tight. Likewise, you should check the tension on the screws/ bolts that hold the action in place. Even with a low-recoiling rimfire rifle, action sorews or soope rings can come loose during normal shooting.



Make a Cheoklist - Pack the Night Before. Ever drive 50 miles to a match then discover you have the wrong ammo or that you forgot your bolt? Well, mistakes like that happen to the best of us. You can avoid these oversights (and reduce stress at matches) by making a checklist of all the stuff you need. Organize your firearms, range kit, ammo box, and shooting accessories the night before the match. And, like a good Boy Soout, "be prepared". Bring a jacket and hat if it might be cold. If you have windflags, bring them (even if you're not sure the rules allow them). Bring spare batteries, and it's wise to bring a spar rifle and ammo for it. If you have just one gun, a simple mechanical breakdown (such as a broken firing pin) can ruin your whole weekend.

The bedding can be checked with a dial indicator that measures in ten thousandths by checking the movement between the barrel and forend of the stock as the action sorews are loosened and tightened. There should not be any more than 0.002" movement between the barrel and the forend. If there is more than that, say 0.003°, you have a bedding problem and your rifle will not shoot to its potential. The action cannot bind in the stook. With a round receiver, you should be able to take the guard screws out of the stook and have the barreled action drop out of the stook. Flat bottom receivers with square sides won't do this. But, even with them, the barreled action should come easily out of the stook. The bedding area and the receiver should be completely clean before they are sorewed together. Even the smallest piece of crud between the action and the bedding surface will show up when the dial indicator test is used. All action sorews should not touch any part of the stook except at the screw heads. Likewise, the bolt handle must not touch any part of the stook. When the bedding tests out right, don't take the action out of the stock any more than absolutely necessary. Every time the action is removed is just taking a chance of nicking the action or messing up the bedding area in the stook. Really tight sorews are not necessary; so don't get carried away tightening guard screws.

Conventional glass bedding has all the advantages of pillar bedding except that the bedding can easily be ruined if the guard screws are over-tightened. I personally know of only one competitor that used conventional glass bedding and he may not anymore. (To my knowledge, he doesn't compete anymore.) There may be more that I am unaware, but this is an area that is not listed on competitor equipment lists.

Stook shape makes a difference in accuraoy not because it makes the rifle's potential accuracy any better, but because it makes that accuracy easier to obtain. That is why benchrest rifles have three-inch wide flat forends. But, stook shape has to be practical for the purpose that the rifle is to be used. After all, who would want a deer rifle with a three-inch flat forend?

The Soope

An accurate rifle is only as good as the scope mounted on it. Scopes that are good for one use may not be good for other uses. Most of the soopes used in benchrest competition are Leupold, Lyman conversions, Bausch & Lomb, or Weaver 36 power target scopes. They are great for obtaining the most accuracy that you can get from your rifle. But, they are highly impractical for a hunting rifle. They do have a place for use in a hunting rifle, though. A 36-power scope is a great scope for working up the load that you will use with your accurate hunting rifle and then switching to the scope that you will use for hunting. My heavy barreled .280 will shoot significantly smaller groups with a high power target scope than it will with the Kahles 8x56 that it has on it now. The 8x56 will, however, shoot 1-inch groups at 100 yards by full moon light and better under better light. In Texas, as in the rest of the United States, you have to watch your watch when you are hunting with it or you could get in trouble for deer hunting too late. It will allow you to make that shot on a cloudy day at the limit of legal hunting time that a lesser soope wouldn't be able to see.

An accurate scope has to be able to hold its point of aim. The scope is one of the variables over which we have the least control. It is commonly said that benchrest shooters don't look for accurate rifles, they look for accurate scopes. A scope that loses a shot can be enough to make you lose a match or worse. With an unlimited rail gun set on eighteen inch genters, one thousandth of an inch movement will move you approximately 2/10" on the target at 100 yards. With a scope, the inner adjustment tube may only be 3 or 4 inches. That same movement within the scope of 0.001 could move you well over an inoh at the same distance. By comparison, a sheet of paper measures approximately .004. It is a wonder that the soopes that are in production are as accourate as they are and it is a marvel

to the machining ability of the optical industry.

For the past several years, there have been a number of modifications to target soopes to help limit movement on the adjustments and also, to limit movement in the parallax in either the objective or by other means. These have ranged from setsorews opposite the turrets to ooil spring plungers and some other internal modifioations as done by Ceoil Tuoker of Odessa, TX. Diok Thomas at Premier Reticles at one time fixed the objective in place and moved the parallax adjustment to a set of lenses in front of the turrets. He hasn't offered that modification for quite some time. Jim Carstensen, presently (2002), makes a modification that looks the objective front and rear on Leupold 36 BR's and also has a modifigation to the objective to suppress movement on the older non-looking Leupold 36's. Burris has taken Ceoil's modification a step farther on their scopes with the introduction of the Burris Posi-look that combines a ooil spring plunger and looking mechanism on the plunger. This has to be a good idea, especially on a hunting rifle that is sighted in and then usually left alone.

It goes without saying that the accurate rifle cannot be accurate without high quality ammunition, but that's another story.

No matter what the shape, no matter what the weight, no matter what the oaliber or purpose, the same elements that make a benchrest rifle accurate are the same elements that make a hunting rifle accurate. I hope that this discussion has left you with a little more insight into why certain rifles are accurate and why some are not.



Lee Hachigian - Benchrest

***How did you become interested in shooting benchrest matches?

I live close to WWCCA, and during the summers I would go to the range to try out new handloads with my hunting rifles. During a summer weekend in 1999, after shooting my rifles I wandered over to the 200 yard range to see what was going on. I was immediately amazed at the fact that these guys were literally shooting one hole groups. I asked a few individuals the obvious questions, what galiber are you shooting, what actions you are using, why the stooks are painted, etc. Everyone was very friendly and informative. I would say; at that point I was hooked. I read everything I could on the subject of preoision shooting the next few months, and attended several more matches at WW-CCA as an observer. I remember buying the Benchrest Primer and reading it two or three times. In August 1999, I sent out letters to various gunsmiths that were highlighted in the book and Precision Shooting



magazine. Jim Borden responded with a well written letter, and shortly thereafter I ordered my first LV benchrest rifle.

***When did you start shooting matches?

My first Group Match was in June 2000. I showed up with my new blue flaked painted TPE actioned LV rifle. Joe Krupa helped me out right from the get-go when he saw me struggling to use my right-hand Bald Eagle windage rest (apparently, reaching under the rifle to change windage was not conducive to small groups..., I am a lefty). After he took my rest apart and moved the windage, Joe asked me how much powder I was using. When I told him around 27 grains of

V-133, he told me to go up a few numbers on my Harrell powder measure. I grains of V-133, he told me to go up a few numbers on my Harrell powder measure. I did, and in my first registered match I shot a 0.090 small group and finished 3rd in LV 100. I will never forget that match, and I still have the trophies and the target.

***Where do you usually shoot and in what regions?

WWCCA is my home range, and I shoot primarily in the Eastern Region. I practice and tune my guns at WWCCA which I think helped me to become a better shooter. The concrete benches at WWCCA are all on the 200 yard range. Outside of our registered matches we are not allowed to set up the frames at 100 yards. So all my practicing is at 200 yards.

"**What are the favorite ranges you shoot and why?

I enjoy shooting at the Holton Gun Club. They have nice facilities and good places to eat nearby. It seems that everyone is very relaxed that shoot the regional matches there. I also enjoy Kelbly's and St. Louis. It just seems like I have a good handle on the range and conditions, and I've shot well there. St. Louis is one of the nicest benchrest ranges in the county. ***What equipment do you use, rifles, rests, sandbags, etc.?

My LY rifles are BAT actions and my railgun (J. Young) holds a Grizzly action. My rest is a past iron Bald Eagle with a Dunrud Hydraulic windage top. Sandbags are SEBs. I normally shoot Lowell Hottenstein bullets.

***Who builds your rifles?

I am fortunate to live in the state with one of the premier benchrest gunsmith (Dwight Soott) and most prominent stook builders (Bob Sooville and Bob Soarbroungh Jr.).

***What do you contribute to your longevity in shooting benchrest?

I have somewhat of stressful job, so Benchrest shooting has always been more of an opportunity for me to relax and have fun. Along the way you win a few matches, and it becomes more of a competitive thing. However, if it stopped being fun, I would sell my equipment.

***What advice would you give to a new shooter?

Don't pay too much attention what you read on the internet (most of the people that post haven't won a thing at registered matches). Recent books on Benchrest by Mike Ratigan and Tony Boyer



are very good source, and a good starting point. I also suggest asking questions to seasoned veterans at the matches. Try to load next to one of the better competitors in the sport, and ask key questions like, where you are seating your bullets, how much powder are you using, what is your shooting style, etc. The key is to try the things that they are telling you. Jack Neary provides a great service with his seminars before some of the larger matches. They are well worth attending. ""What do you attribute to your success?

Good equipment (barrels, bullets, and powder), and if it's just not shooting well I will make a change with powder and seating depth. Understanding how to tune your rifle and how changes in load and seating impacts the group size, are the key to shooting small. Lastly, an attitude of "let's just have fun", there is always the next match.






