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MIDLAND TEXAS HOSTED THE 2017 TEXAS SHOOTOUT

ON THE COVER...

Midland Texas hosted the 2017 Texas Shootout for both Light and Heavy Varmint. Attendance was excellent this year with a total of 30 shooters signed in. For the weekend we even had four members of the US team that earned spots to compete in New Zealand. No doubt it was a strong field this weekend and it would make for some very competitive matches.

Practice day on Friday provided the shooters with the full spectrum of conditions. Most of the morning, the notorious West Texas winds were a no-show. However, by afternoon everything started to change starting with the appearance of some tricky winds that changed into a heavy down pour from a summer thunder storm. Of course the storm rolled in right in the middle of everyone trying to set flags for the morning, sending many shooters into town for the evening. Well, at least we wouldn't have to worry about blowing dust for the next few days!

Saturday's matches would all be at 100 yards and started off with Light Varmint. Temps were in the upper 70's and humidity was high for West Texas at around 65%. The wind was close to a dead calm when shooting kicked off at 9:00 but throughout the morning conditions changed enough that each match was a bit more challenging than the previous.

After all five matches in Light Varmint were

completed Mike Conry had the lead with a .2250 agg, Gene Bukys was second with a .2340 and Randy Pumphrey took third shooting a .2370. Randy also had the small group with a .119 group he shot in the fifth match.

The afternoon Heavy Varmint 100 began after lunch was served in the Midland Clubhouse. Humidity was now down in the 20's to 30's and temps were getting close to 90 degrees. We had a 5 to 10 mph wind mostly from the South/Southwest but starting to get swiitchy from the South/

This time Gene Bukys had the dope on small groups and won shooting a .2476, Tim Oltersdorf kept it close with his second place agg of .2546. Third place went to Scott Haywood with a .2554. Tim also shot the small group with a .119 matching what Randy shot earlier in the LV match.

Saturday's Two Gun agg after both 100 yard matches with Gene Bukys in the lead, Tom Brown in second and Larry Baggett in third.

Sunday morning came and it was looking like the weather was going to be identical as the day before. Temps and winds were what a local shooter would say is a very good morning to shoot in West Texas. But we knew that by afternoon, we were going to need to be prepared for some tough mirage at the 200 yards.

The Heavy Varmint rifles started off first, it was apparent that the changes John Horn had made after Saturday to his guns were working well for him and was evident with his shooting. John walked away with the HV after trouncing the field with a .1806 agg! Second place was Larry Baggett with a .2292 and Dr. Tim Oltersdorf third with .2343, Larry shot a tiny .195 group in the second match for the HV 200 yard small

Light Varmint matches commenced late morning and John continued to shoot well and once again rolled over the other shooters posting a .2137 agg. Gene Bukys .2547 was good for second place and third went to Britt Robinson. John shot a .194 in the second match that held up as the small group.

Once the smoke cleared and final targets measured, the Grand's we posted, LV went to Gene Bukys, .2426, Britt Robinson second, .2919, Gary Bristow third with a .2839. HV Grand went to John Horn, .2301, Tim Oltersdorf second, .2445 and Gene Bukys .2466 was good for third place.

The Two Gun Grand had Gene Bukys as the leader with a .2446. John Horn second with a .2573 and Scott Haywood third with .2831.

The Midland shooters would like to thank all the competitors for their participation this weekend and hope to see them back in in late August for the Buffalo Classic. We would also like to invite everyone to attend the Buffalo as it's sure to be another very competitive test in our sport.

COMMON BENCHREST FAULTS AND FIXES

I have been working off and on with a few new shooters. While doing so I have noticed some common faults. Once I started checking, I found that many of these problems affect not only the new but also the more experienced shooters as well.

Here are some of the issues that I keep seeing:

Front bag to hard

In general most front bags are packed too hard resulting in unexplained flyers. This year we changed my shooting partner Billy Stevens', front bag to a fluffier front bag like mine. After a few months he said, "You know this front bag doesn't throw shots nearly as consistently as my old one!"

Some bags are packed with too much sand while others have packed down from shooting on them. In my opinion, you should have the front bag more on the fluffy side. My front bag is like a marshmallow. The ones I've checked

are closer to bricks. So, let some sand time on the target. out and fluff them up. All bags will pack down over time. I make it a point to reach up and squeeze/fluff my front bag each time I set up at the bench. Hall of Fame member Smiley Hensley was getting unexplained shots at the 2013 Super Shoot. Someone suggested fluffing his front bag and there you go! Problem solved!

My personal preference is regular sand, not zircon. The weight and density of zircon tends to pack down too hard too fast.

Guns Too slick

Many shooters spend a lot of time trying to get their guns slick in the bags. Just put two fingers on the gun and pull it back and push it forward. It's as if it's riding on air or roller bearings! Hey guess what? It's not what you want! The problem with this is that gun handling errors are significantly magnified. So, if you make a little mistake (such as slightly jerking/slapping your trigger or bumping the gun), it will show up big

The worst setup I've seen is shooting an unpainted fiberglass stock with a cordura front and rear bag. This setup is super slick. I've had guns like this and it feels like you can't get near the thing without it moving. Stock tape can help to slow them down as well as providing consistent tension when sliding on the bags.


Proper Front Bag Tension.

This is part of the gun being too slick. One of the first things that Tony Boyer corrected in my set up was having my ears on my front bag too loose. On his range, you're shooting slightly up hill. He came over and pulled my rifle back and forth and said. "You need to tighten those ears." I was surprised at just how much he cranked the screws down. Tony told me it would cut down on the "finger-vertical" I was getting. Guess what??? He was right. Since that time, I've shot with very firm fore-end tension on my rifles.

Consistency

What I'm talking about here is when your rifle slides back and forth. It should be very consistent and feel the same as you move the gun back and forth. This allows the rifle to break the same every time when fired. Actually "FIRM and CONSISTENT" is what you're looking for. Some bag set ups are grabby. As you pull the rifle back it catches and break loose, then catches and breaks loose again. Not optimum! Others feel kind of stuck as they first move and then break loose. So, if your gun is doing any of this, you need to work on it.

I took Billy Stevens lead and went retro with my bag set up. We started talking about front and rear bags and decided our guns shot better and more



consistently twenty years ago. So, we have both gone back to leather bags (front and rear) and using baby powder! This gives me a set up that provides consistent and firm tension.

Front Rests

Another very common problem is simply forgetting to tighten things down on your rest. Always check to make sure the feet on you front rests are tightened down. Also check to make sure the center post of your rest is locked down. It's easy to forget and can cost you dearly during a match.

Farley Front Rest

The Farley front rest is probably the most popular front rest in Benchrest. However, of the new shooters rests that I have checked most of them were too loose. What I mean by too loose is when you let go of the aiming handle while looking through your scope you can see the crosshairs move.

So, a properly adjusted Farley will move smoothly and stop when I stop. When I let go of the handle, the crosshairs should stay put. If yours isn't doing this, simply loosen the two large nuts and turn the tensioning screws clockwise for increased pressure. It's important that each screw be turned the same amount, and it only takes a small adjustment.

Scope and Rings

This is all very simple stuff, but still often over looked. A loose screw on a scope ring or base can ruin a match or even an entire season! Rifles have been sold and perfectly good bullets and barrels tossed aside because of not diligently checking these things! I had a killer heavy varmint rifle. It shot well enough to win a yardage and grand aggregate at the Super Shoot! It also won my first Hall of Fame point! But it quit shooting! I couldn't figure it out. I tried different barrels, scopes, bullets. I changed out triggers the firing pin springs, nothing helped. Finally, I took off the scope and sat the rifle in the corner. I gave up on it for years. Finally one day during the winter with nothing to do, I started going through the rifle again. To my surprise I found that one of the screws on the front base was loose. That one little screw caused all this trouble. So check everything. It's the little things that kill us.

Scope Lock Rings

No matters what scope you own it has one or more lock rings that you must pay attention to. Tony Boyer was probably the first to notice that the lock ring for the eye piece on the Leopold competition scopes loves to come loose.

The first thing I check on a rifle if it starts shooting crazy is the objective lock ring (if the scope has one) and the lock ring in front of the eye piece. I can't count the times this year that I found the eye piece lock ring loose on shooters scopes! Just because you tighten it down that doesn't mean it's going to stay that way. At the last match of the year at Brock's Gap I tightened lock rings five times. Twice on one shooter's gun during the same aggregate!

If you don't think the lock ring in front of your eye piece is doing anything, loosen the ring and just push around on the eye piece while looking through the scope. That should make you a believer.

So if it has a screw, tighten it! If it has a lock ring, lock it! If it has a knob twist

None of this is rocket science. It's just meat and potatoes common sense. The devil is in the details. In this sport, close isn't good enough. Your equipment has to be at 100 percent in order to compete. and to stay on top of it, you must constantly check it!

Conclusion

Implement the above changes into your set up, and I think you will see an increase in your accuracy and a lot fewer nasty flyers!



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



THE BLUE COLLAR WORKER

Is There a Future in Centerfire Benchrest for the Blue-Collar Worker?

"My People"

Born to common folk Those who live in small towns and rent houses for double their worth. Who go to Sunday worship to rest for the afternoon game of ball which they read about in Monday's paper. Who graduate from high school or less to work in fields and factories for daily bread, a Friday drink and none for the future. Folks who think that dinner is a family time when God is thanked and praised and each is given his place and time to talk and be talked to so that the love for each is felt by all. People who think ice cream and popcom and picnics are as exciting as children do fairytales,

and a fire in the fireplace seals and warms the love of those who gaze. Yes, these are my folks. Born with nothing - dying the same. They're common folk.

Thank God.

I was reared in the coal mining, farming country of southern Illinois. Because of its climate of high humidity and temperature, the natives of the region often joke about it being the armpit of the nation. If you have ever shot any matches at St. Louis, Missouri, in the summer months you might understand. I was born in 1945 and of course, during my childhood, life was much slower and simpler. Much of my preschool time was spent living with my grandparents. Grandpa was my male role model. Many times on weekends, he would take his paycheck to the local bar and buy enough booze for he and his buddies so that the next day hangovers were a common thing. However, he seemed to always spare enough for the weekly needs of myself, my parents and grandma. Wen we moved to our own house, my father had difficulty maintaining a reliable job. Eventually, my four siblings and myself were very well trained at quickly finding our assigned hiding places when the bill collectors knocked on our door. Since then, I have always had a concern for the average person in need.

I taught high school biology from 1968 to 1995. During that time, I was given a secondary job coaching golf. Coaches are only as good as their players. I was fortunate to have some great players. Several eventually played professional golf. My daughter was one of those players and did so successfully. In 1995, I retired from teaching to coach her on tour. During my off times at home, I started shooting target rifles. In the fall of 2002, I bought my first benchrest gun. It was a used 6ppc with a McMillan stock and a Panda action. Golf had been a good fit for my loner personality. I would find an open field area and hit 200 to 300 practice balls a day. However, the amount of practice and play damaged my hips which forced me to stop playing. Benchrest then became my primary activity. I was fascinated by the accuracy and the need for attention to detail. Don Moulder, who sold me the gun and Dick Wright, who ran matches at Harrison, Michigan, helped me get started. Dick connected me with Dwight Scott and Bart Sauter. Both were very helpful. In talking to Bart, he recommended. I shoot at least 1000 practice rounds a month which I did. Hobie Bohn brought a 44-pound keg of 133 to Holton, in October of 2006 which I purchased. During that winter, I shot 40 pounds of that keg prior to the 2007 Super Shoot. Dwight Scott chambered two Krieger barrels for me that spring. Joe Krupa had given me a box of 500 Bart's Ultras which I decided to use after accidentally mixing two other boxes which I had planned to use. With those barrels and bullets, the blind hog found an acorn. I won the 2007 Super Shoot.

Ron Breedlove, my traveling and shooting buddy, rode home with me that evening. We were both in disbelief. Ron was a Nam Vet. and had worked most of his life in the oil fields. We had spent many cold, winter Saturday's loading in his propane heated cemetery shed hauled directly from the Kelly Cemetery in Oil City, Michigan. He bought the shed at an auction. He was the only bidder. He had built a two bench range, and his reloading shed sheltered for us and a large population of biting spiders. A great place for two country boys shooting guns - what more could you ask for. Ron's name may never appear in any benchrest record books, but he is one of those guys who is part of the true backbone of benchrest shooting. As in golf, average people make up the main body of the sport.

Having won some money at the Super Shoot, I called my accountant to ask what should be done. He told me to figure my shooting expenses for that year. I had done something that year that no one else has ever done. I bought sev-



rels, bullets, actions, powder... (I did tell her about the scope). I decided to come clean. So, we sat down together and started a list. When it reached an embarrassing point, I stopped and I told her we didn't have that kind of money to spend on my benchrest. She enthusiastically agreed. Because of that decision, as well as additional monetary family needs, my benchrest match actively began to lessen.

In 2009, my left hip was replaced, and I started playing golf again. I then realized that necessary golf equipment had increases in price as much as shooting essentials. I surmised that the Housing Crisis of 2008 and \$4.00/gallon gas were the culprits, however, talking with golf course managers proved differently. They said that it started shortly after 9/11. As the economy began to dim, many of those who still had money, stopped spending. Weekends that had been big money makers for courses, were no more. Many families had scaled down their weekend activities. Some individuals with extra money began supporting small private golf clubs to keep them functioning. However, a large number of courses had to close down. At many public courses, owners began brainstorming to develop packages to keep the middle class golfer playing.

When my wife an I would go golfing,

eral items without telling my wife - only bar- we would still see golfers on the course and never did we realize how difficult it was at that time for some golf courses to just survive. However, when we went to benchrest matches, it was obvious... the number of shooters was drastically decreas-

This has been a question discussed many times. Golf people seem to be analyzing their dilemma based on three parameters: 1. cost, 2. time spent per event, and 3. difficulty of the even platform (course).

There are a number of parameters that could be used to help increase benchrest numbers. These might be considered as starters:

- More promotion (what is centerfire benchrest).
- Increasing beginning instruction using quality equipment.
- Develop cost list for basic equipment new and used.
 - Develop a comfortable match venue.

Over the past year and a half, at the Isabella County Sportsman's Club (600 members) five new shooters have been introduced to benchrest. All have purchased a high quality benchrest 6ppc rifle with all the necessary accessories. Two are in the process of building their own ranges. Two of them also purchased 22, 8lb. jugs of 133 last

volved and easier to play (you don't have to be week. All five are progressing well. Any shooter, at our range, who is interested is welcome to join one of our practice sessions. Eventually, if they seem reliable, they probably will - under supervision - shoot one of my guns. This introductory shooting experience, using good equipment, allowed some early success. The reality of equipment cost was then explained, and help was given finding good used equipment. The difficult part is having or making the time to bring about these results. When you do, you spend much of your range time not shooting yourself.

After the new shooters acquired their equipment and became more acquainted with shooting procedures and loading, they then participated in simulated score and group matches. These were 3 target matches with the shooters loading and cleaning after each target. The simulation was timed and run like a regular match. Each target was scored and discussed at the end of the event.

Three of the shooters are interested in having a second gun made. We had discussed Bob Scarbrough, Jr., both as a stock maker and as a top quality shooter. Consequently, arrangements were made to have Bob come to Isabella Sportsman's Club. When he arrived he spent the morning answering their questions. While doing that, he explained some of his shooting philosophies, methods and loading techniques. He added personal experiences which really set a positive tone.

The afternoon was spent at the range where Bob evaluated bench set-up, gun handling and shooting techniques of each shooter. He provided them with a wealth of information. Everyone was impressed.

Bob is the epitome of a blue-collar shooter. He has become a premiere world class competitor and stock maker in spite of limited finances and many unsettling life events.

Ten years ago, he decided to simplify his approach to shooting. Since then, with honest determination and a solid work ethic, he has qualified for the Benchrest Hall of Fame, as well as the three World Teams. While participating in World Team competitions, he has won 5 gold medals, 4 silver medals and 5 bronze. He has set 2 world records and has finished in the top ten 7 times in his last 9 Super Shoots. (Was 2nd in the 3-gun in this years Super Shoot).

Bob gives Dwight Scott credit for being the most positive influence in his shooting career. In 1990, Lowell Hottenstein instilled in Bob his never give up attitude - "Scratch and Claw" Theory in regard to shooting. Bob took Lowell's advice with his highly competitive wife, Nancy, reminding him, he "scratches and



claws better than most".

During Bob's discussion with the new shooters at the Isabella range, two were very an-imate about the fact that they would not have started benchrest had they not been given ade-quate help and instruction. One shooter very honestly admitted that the benchrest learning curve is way too large for a new shooter to achieve enough success working by himself to maintain the amount of interest in the sport. He truthfully stated that he was from the beginning of the "instant gratification generation."

Bob has stated several times that what these shooters have learned in less than 1/2 of a year with help, would take most individuals 4 to 5 years to learn on their own. I feel he is probably right. That need for "instant gratification" may be a sign of the times.

The Isabella Club, with help of Matt Dardas and Dick Wright may have somewhat satis-fied the fourth parameter as previously mentioned - a more comfortable venue. Over the passed several years, I have tried promoting one day matches with an agg, in the morning and a second in the afternoon. We have a range which will accommodate 100, 200 and 300 yard distances. Consequently, we would alternate matches of various distances. (Ex. 200 in the morning and 300 in the afternoon.) We have no backer system. In recent years, the numbers have greatly de-creased. I assumed it was the same trend I saw at other matches. Last fall, I decided for a number of reasons, to ask Matt Dardas to supervise the matches this year, and he agreed to do so. He asked Dick Wright to assist him. They changed the format to one 100-yard match approximately every other Saturday, starting in late April. The schedule alternates a score match one Saturday with a group match the next, fashioned like the matches Dick organized at Harrison. There are both factory and VFS classes. The matches seem to be a comfortable fit for the new shooters, as well as, all those involved. Afterwards, they go to the local bar for a sandwich. Perhaps, the ideas of one agg, and a sandwich is the same as five holes and a sandwich in golf. I, along with several Michigan shooters, started at Harrison. We definitely need small matches that attract new shooters, as well as, providing a base where local shooters can gather. If the average person, is going to start shooting benchrest, it will more than likely be in a small match at a local range.

Another aspect, is the comment often heard that the same people always win. Those people, who always win, actually might be more talented and work harder. Also, it is true that some have more finances to purchase good equipment. Again that's where Bob Scarbrough. Jr. needs to be mentioned. He does not have the money to buy a lot of equipment. He has learned to get the most out of what he has, and a large part of that, is not only learning his equipment, using proper bench techniques and reading wind well, but, as he says, he feels 70% of shooting success is learning how to load for the conditions at that moment.

However, what can we do to maintain the interest of the average shooter? What can we do to allow them to feel they have achieved some level of success? Perhaps, this has been tried already, but I've talked with Matt Dardas about developing a computerized handicap system for matches at Isabella. If possible, that would not only give actual match winners of 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places, but we could also have a winner of the handicap division. Then more shooters regardless of skill set might be able to, achieve a level of success.

In golf, my daughter's talent gave me the opportunity to sit at the Jack Nicklaus' dinner table and share a meal with Jack and several other highly skilled and famous players. I learned very quickly that without a population of people who support and appreciate golf, my daughter would have never been able to do what she did and Jack Nicklaus would not have been able to become the Jack Nicklaus we know today.

I never have played nor will I ever play in a golf tournament where I compete with Jack Nicklaus. But in 2003, when I attended my first Super Shoot, I hoped for three things: 1. my gun would shoot when I pulled the trigger and I would handle it safely, 2. that I would not get in anyone's way and 3. that from a distance, I could watch the greatest benchrest shooter who ever lived - Tony

And then... in 2007, the impossible occurred, and I was handed the Super Shoot Trophy. I had attended major golf championships, and I knew the tournament organizers always wanted a star-laden leader board which would insure a well known, worthy champion. Therefore, I felt at that moment, when I received the trophy, I was not that kind of winner. My plan was to accept the trophy and leave as quietly as possible. So, with the trophy in hand, I turn to make my escape, and there he was, with a smile, and his hand extended to shake mine - Tony Boyer.

I am saddened when I see the number of shooters decreasing at matches and feel guilty for not being there. As with Jack Nicklaus, without a population of shooters who attend and support matches, Tony Boyer would not be the Tony Boyer that has become in benchrest shoot-ing.

The many people in benchrest who I have met and learned to appreciate are very special to me. I'm not able to go to big matches as I use to. Consequently, I'm going to do everything I can to promote centerfire benchrest and bring new people into the sport. I believe the future maybe difficult for the blue-collar shooter. However, if we can find a way to establish a more solid shooting population, perhaps, the Bob Scarbroughs of the world still have an opportunity to compete, and then maybe, in the future, some poor boy from the comfields of Illinois might shake the hand of the greatest bench shooter in the world.

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


Saying Good-Bye to an Old Friend

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
